Curriculum Objectives

This course unit studies Israel's poetic literature and practice of prayer and worship as represented in the Psalter. It provides an opportunity to develop exegetical skills in the analysis of Hebrew poetry

Assessment Profile

Assessment 1: A reflective essay on a key theme that is addressed in several different Psalms (e.g. the characteristics of a "happy" person as described in the 'ashre psalms of the Psalter). [Outcomes 2, 4 and 5]

Assessment 2: A written essay that analyses a (short) Psalm with attention to its poetic techniques and rhetorical structure. [Outcomes 1, 2, 3 and 4]

Assessment 3: A comprehensive exegesis of a selected Psalm and application of its message for a collective worship setting or for the life of an individual believer. [Outcomes 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5]
